



Cape Town International Kite Festival – 10 & 11 Oct 2009

Creative Kite Competition Entry Form

The Creative Competition takes place on Sunday 11th October from 14h00. It is all about originality and creativity using simple, affordable materials to make a kite and have some fun. Think recyclable, think 'green'.

There will be some of the world's most hi-tech kites at the Cape Town International Kite Festival but great kites can be made with very simple and cheap materials. Most adults can reminisce fondly about the plastic bag or bamboo-and-newspaper kites of childhood. Great for family fun, great for team-building!

To take part in the Creative Kite Competition create your kite at home and bring it to the Festival on Sunday. Judging starts at 14h00 sharp.

Here are the rules!

1. There are three categories:

- Individual junior – 16 years old and younger (entry fee R10 per kite)
- Individual adult – 17 years old and older (entry fee R10 per kite)
- Corporates (R100 per kite)

People's Post Creative Kite Award: there will be a special prize in all three categories for kites made using the People's Post community newspaper.

2. The maximum cost of all the materials used to make your kite must not be more than R25 per kite. Entrants to provide a list of all the materials used noting the costs. Only the material used needs to be counted. E.g. If a newspaper costs R10 and you've used one page out of 20 pages, then the cost is 50c. (*Good news – **the People's Post** is a free community paper so you can use as many pages as you like!*)
3. Kites must be hand-made. No shop bought kites allowed!
4. Kites must be able to fly.
5. Register your kite before 13h30 on Sunday 11 October at the INFO station. Judging will take place at the festival from 14h00.

Judging – points will be awarded for:

1. Creativity, design and decoration
2. Workmanship. Your kite must be able to fly, but we will also judge it on the ground to see the care and attention to detail you put into it.
3. Flying Ability. Stability, ease of handling, ability to handle wind are some of the aspects we will look at in the flying part of the judging.
4. Originality. There are many plans available on the internet, and lots of kite designs to choose from. We will award bonus points for originality, and innovative ideas.



Tips and guidelines

- Paper, especially newspaper, can be stuck together using homemade glue (water and flour mixed together).
- There might not be much wind – if your kite is too small or heavy you might not be able to run fast enough to get it off the ground to show that it can fly.
- There might be a lot of wind – if your kite is too flimsy or fragile it might break.
- If you use the People’s Post community newspaper to make your kite you could win in the People’s Post Creative Kite Award.

Registration

- Registration is at the INFO station. You may register on Saturday between 11h00 and 17h00 and Sunday between 10h00 and 13h30. Registration closes at 13h30 on Sunday.
- Payment must be made when you register (R10 individuals / R100 companies).
- Judging will take place on Sunday 11th October from 14h00 sharp in the kite arena.
